Happy Tuesday Bulldog Team!

I hope your extended Memorial Day holiday was enjoyable and relaxing! Yesterday evening, as the forecast for today began to firm up, I began receiving staff concerns about Broad Street, Cherry Street and Indian Avenue. After discussing scenarios with the leadership team and Board President, we decided the best course was a one session day today. While we allowed staff to leave after student supervisory responsibilities were addressed, if we have additional unscheduled heat related half days, all staff should plan to find a cool zone in their buildings to work until the end of the day.



As a result of <u>Cumberland County's CALI score</u> slipping back into the high category, I immediately reached out today to our local Health Department. We


discussed our district and recent <u>NJDOH recommendations</u> for school districts if we move to high: <u>Masking:</u> When other mitigation measures such as spacing cannot be achieved, universal masking is recommended.

<u>Activities:</u> Carefully consider which activities can continue such as field trips, sports, and events.

<u>Screening & Testing:</u> Testing of unvaccinated staff and student athletes should occur more frequently.

<u>Consultation:</u> School districts should regularly consult with their local health departments and report outbreaks immediately.

At this time, no school district in our region has gone back to universal masking. Although Cherry Street saw a number of student cases last week, the Health department could not tie these cases to the



school, and the school is not currently designated as being in outbreak status. Still, out of an abundance of caution, please continue to wear your masks as much as possible, and strongly encourage students to do so while our region is in the high range for community transmission.



She strives to empower students through joint control of classroom learning activities such as running the morning meeting. Ms. Murphy says that watching the students grow through the "I do," "we do," "you do," process is amazing. She loves to instruct with books that have a repeating refrain so the students can join in with "reading," and it becomes interactive. Ms. Murphy reminds us that reading on grade level by third grade is extremely important to a student's future success. She says to always look for ways you can strengthen sound literacy practices that are already in place-think outside the box! As a master teacher, she loves that she can help guide teachers, model lessons and provide professional development to ensure rigorous literacy practice, such as shared reading!



Olga Carlson (above) is a literacy leader with 28 years of experience! She is currently a preschool



master teacher that loves interacting with students through read alouds. Ms. Carlson loves working with Story Play this year and the engagement it brings to the lesson. She says that students recall information from the text more quickly and carry their understanding into writing through drawing and sentence formulation. Ms. Carlson loves to see the students flourish in identifying letters and letter sounds and says it is so exciting to be a part of the students' first steps to literacy. She says that preschool sets the foundation which all other grades build upon. Her advice to new teachers is to get to know your students and to remember that each one is a unique individual. She also says to keep a sense of humor!

Denise Riley is a literacy leader serving Bridgeton for 15 years! She has experience in special education and is now serving as a preschool master teacher. Ms. Riley's favorite part of teaching is seeing the students enjoy learning and witnessing their "aha" moments! She is proud of her implementation of Universal Design for Learning in her
