Happy Monday Bulldog Team!



When I think of our students here in Bridgeton, I am reminded of the sophisticated, meaningful, and mature discussions our students engaged in at Cherry Street during its evening and student-led NJEA-sponsored Black Lives Matter at School Week event back in February. Our remarkable students here in Bridgeton and youth across the nation are repeatedly leading the way in this important conversation.


<u>Take home message:</u> We must continue to listen to and embrace the powerful voices of our youth.
