I want to thank all staff members who have contributed feedback as part of my Listening Tours! At this time, the central leadership team and I are steeped in the work of planning for the safe and appropriate reopening of schools, which includes:

- * Tweaking and developing policies and procedures developed by our various reopening committees.
- * Updating the grading and attendance policies to support better accountability this year for participation in online instruction.
- * Planning strong professional development sessions around remote learning to support teachers at the start of and throughout the school year.
- Surveying and meeting the technology needs of all students and fami-

- * Preparing and posting "how to" videos and support for parents and students on our website.
- * Planning a SAFE, memorable, and energizing Community Walk (ride by caravan-style this year) on Thursday, September 3rd to kick off the (100% remote or hybrid) 2020-2021 school year.
 - * Please click here to indicate if you are willing to remain in your personal vehicles or partner up with a colleague to follow your principal and a bus decorated with welcome back messages and music, as it travels through your school community. Mileage reimbursement and insurance liability will be on employees, and we would schedule the event at the end of the 2nd day of staff in-service trainings, leaving from all schools from 2:30 to 3:30 pm. Pamphlets would NOT be exchanged this year. Instead, we would have signs, banners, posters, balloons and music encouraging families to visit our website for more information.


This week, NJ.com requested an interview; I provided the following responses which provides an overview of our reopening plans.

- 1. How many students will be enrolled at the school next year? And how many staff/faculty members are expected to be employed? Approximately 1040 employees and approximately 6200 students.
- 2. Is there anything at all you can tell me about what's currently being considered in terms of a reopening plan? Most importantly, can you tell me if remote learning will remain in place, if everyone will be back in school, or if a hybrid solution will be implemented? A hybrid plan is being considered with students, who will be receiving both remote and in-person instruction. Based on the Governor's directive this week, all families will be afforded the opportunity to opt out of in-person instruction and continue 100% remote.
- 3. Can you tell me anything about the kinds of sanitation/hygiene changes that may be implemented at the school? We will take temperatures of staff and students as they enter, reduce the number of students in the building to 25%, then to 50% when we can safely do so, and social distance appropriately. Sanitation stations will be added. Face coverings will be required on buses, and in the building when 6ft cannot be maintained. Facilities will be cleaned throughout the day, hand washing will occur throughout the day, students will not share equipment. Traffic will be restricted to one way or face coverings will be required. Students will be served meals in their classrooms rather than the cafeteria.
- 4. From conversations/surveys with students, faculty and staff, what does the majority feel should happen in the fall (in-person or online)? What do school administrators prefer to happen? Administrators feel we should prioritize safety and open slowly and cautiously. Our latest staff survey indicates that 73% of staff are comfortable returning, 26% have concerns about coming back, and 7% do not plan to return.
- 5. Are school administrators alone crafting the plan, or are community members (parents, etc.) involved as well? Parents, board members, community members, teachers, staff, and association leaders are on our reopening committees.
- 6. Is there any sort of predominant goal guiding the reopening plan? Staff and student safety are first, which is why we will start at 25% and phase up to 50% of students (out of an abundance of caution); it is also why we will take temperatures daily even though most who present with the virus may not have a temperature, and be asymptomatic.
- 7. When a reopening plan is in place, how will parents be notified of it? After our Aug. 4th Board meeting when the plan will be presented and potentially approved, we will communicate the plan via: our website, virtual town halls, mailings, phone blasts, and virtual meetings.
- 8. Are there any major challenges or problems the district is facing as it plans to reopen (for instance, shortages of things like PPE, plexiglass, cleaning supplies; staffing issues including how to enlist substitute teachers, how to properly limit capacity amongst the student body)? We have a few buildings where air conditioning will be a concern; with staff and students wearing face coverings, we are concerned about the potential of high temperatures and may need to relocate staff and students or reduce the school day schedule even further for certain buildings.
- 9. Do any teachers, staff members, employees, or students not feel comfortable coming back? If so, will they be allowed to continue teaching/learning remotely until there is a vaccine? Staff will have the option of requesting extended leave with one of the qualifying reasons in the Families First Corona Virus Response Act. Per the Governor's guidance, families will have the option to opt out of in-person instruction and receive their instruction remotely.
- 10. Is there anything (a club, a class, a sport, etc.) that will not be available next year as it was in previous years due to the pandemic? If so, can you explain why? We are prepared to offer almost everything (all clubs, classes and sports) once safe and cleared to do so. In the meantime, we offer a virtual alternative where possible, or have all the approvals in place, awaiting clearance to offer.
- 11. Is there anything else you would like to add? Again, these are our preliminary ideas developed by our committees; the final plan will be publicized after our Aug. 4th Board meeting.
